

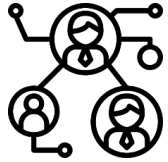

Focused on 5 themes of work

Our goal is to **strengthen equitable and comprehensive child health programs** - focused on children aged 0-19 years in line with Global Strategy for Women's, Children's and Adolescents' Health (2016-2030) - **through primary health care, inclusive of community health systems.**

The Task Force is managed by a Secretariat, led by JSI Research & Training Institute, Inc. (JSI) with funding by USAID.

A Steering Committee provides the Task Force with support, guidance, and oversight. The Steering Committee consists of Aga Khan University-Pakistan, the Global Financing Facility/World Bank, JSI, the Malawi Ministry of Health, Save the Children, UNICEF, USAID, and WHO.

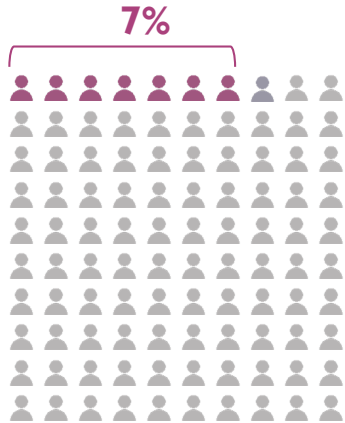

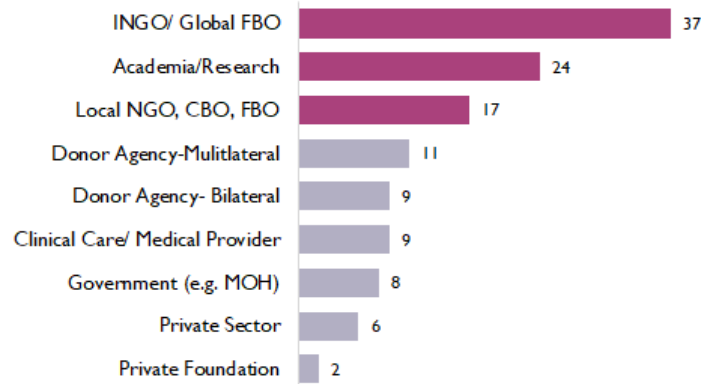
Response Rate:

126 out of 1,904* individuals responded



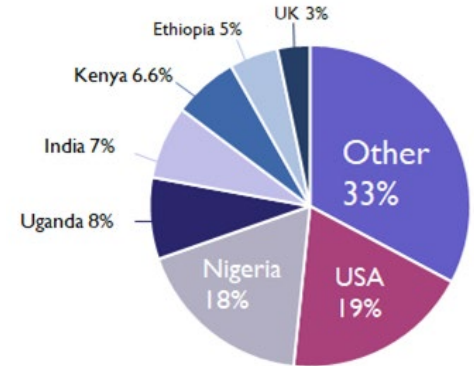
Organization Affiliation:

Strategic Priorities

 STRATEGIC PRIORITY 1: *Engage global and country stakeholders about the need for increased resources, accountability and a multi-sectoral approach to child health.*

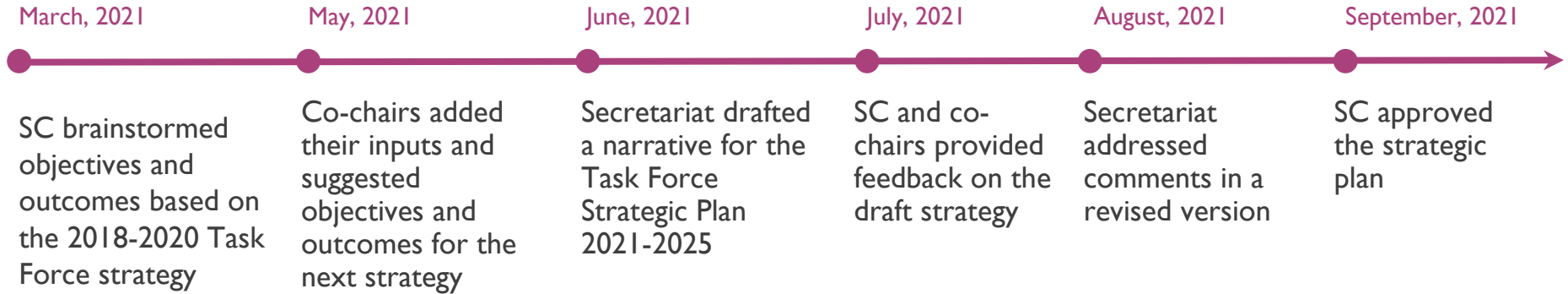
 STRATEGIC PRIORITY 2: *Align around common goals and measures of success for child health along the life-course (including the newborn period, post-neonatal, and adolescence), with a focus on post-neonatal mortality reduction.*

 STRATEGIC PRIORITY 3: *Partner to implement interventions, monitor for equitable coverage and quality care, and track progress towards SDG targets.*

 STRATEGIC PRIORITY 4: *Foster the generation and sharing of evidence, lessons learned, tools and promising program approaches.*

 STRATEGIC PRIORITY 5: *Synthesize and package information in sharable and accessible products and enhance communications.*

*A renewed call to action to end preventable
child deaths*

The Child Health Task Force, Global Financing Facility (GFF), United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), United States Agency for International Development (USAID), and World Health Organization (WHO)

Child Survival Action Plan – key messages

1. Country-led initiative to reach children facing multiple inequities and risk factors
2. Moves away from a “business as usual” approach to planning and implementing health services for children, to address system challenges that hinder progress in countries meeting the SDG target 3.2.
3. Proposes to strengthen PHC, a key platform to enable equitable delivery of high quality interventions, and align disperse programs to concentrate impact.
4. Addresses the significant proportion of under-five deaths in the post-neonatal period in the majority of the 53 off-track countries.
5. Complements newborn and maternal health initiatives along the MNCAH continuum of service delivery to achieve the SDG target 3.2. Builds on the Every Newborn Action Plan (ENAP) and Ending Preventable Maternal Mortality (EPMM)
6. Aims to create a shared vision through one monitoring framework for program tracking of progress and accountability.

Child Survival Action Plan Next Steps

1. The Secretariat will send out more information about the Child Survival Action Plan including a call to action, data analysis, theory of change and specific actions
2. Will request detailed feedback from members either written or through another meeting
3. The M&E subgroup to develop a results framework with targets and milestones
