

1–59-months mortality rate achievement status and required acceleration



A C VOGACY

Increased investment in interventions proven to prevent, diagnose, and treat the leading causes of 1-59 month death:

• pneumonia, malaria, diarrhea, congenital anomalies, tuberculosis, measles, etc

Increased investment in interventions proven to reduce the major risks factors for 1-59 month child death:

• malnutrition, unsafe water and sanitation, no access to handwashing with soap, air pollution, etc

ACVOGACY

Encourage child survival stakeholders to track at least the following five targets to measure progress:

- 90% coverage of vaccines preventing the leading causes of child death (pneumonia, diarrhea, malaria, measles, meningitis)
- 90% careseeking for children with suspected pneumonia
- 90% coverage of ORS and zinc to treat diarrhea
- 90% population access to safely managed drinking water
- 90% population access to safely managed sanitation

Targets regularly measured and published by country







Call to Action in support of Nutrition for Growth

We call on all organizations with a child survival mandate to commit to concrete actions to ensure that the most lifesaving nutrition prevention, diagnosis, and treatment services reach all of the children who need them.
